- 1. Fold vertically (hot dog style)
- 2. Fold horizontally (hamburger style)
- 3. Keep folding into quarters until all "pages" have creases
- 4. Unfold and lay flat
- 5. Cut along the red line
- 6. Fold vertically

Pg 1	Cover
Pg 2	Back Cover
Pg 3	Pg 6
Pg 4	Pg 5

- 7. Hold "Front Cover" and "pg 1" together and "pg 5" and "pg 4" together. Push so that the middle pages accordion apart into a diamond shape
- 8. Finish folding so that all pages are between "Front Cover" and "Back Cover"
